WHAT DOES THE VICTIM/FAMILY/OWNER NEED TO KNOW?

If one of the above events happens at the your house or in your vehicle, then you should contact a biohazard cleanup company.

We highly recommended that you do not enter in to any property or vehicle that has been contaminated by blood or bodily fluids. If you have to go into the property please make sure to wear appropriate PPE - at a minimum a KN-95 mask

Most biocompanies will respond within 1-2 hours.

If the property was not able to be secured by the police or fire department, please let the bio company know that they need to secure the property immediately.

Upon arrival, Bioteam can retrieve any critical documents or items you may need from the property.

Cleanup can take anywhere from a few hours to multiple days, each situation is different

In most cases, homeowner's insurance covers the cost to provide clean up

HARD TO DISPOSE OF ITEMS:

Automotive products: antifreeze, fluids, motor oil, oil filters, gasoline, polish and waxes

Batteries: home and vehicle batteries

Electronics: TVs, computers, laptops, cell phones, printers, fax machines, MP3 players, DVD/CD/cassette players and more

Fluorescent light bulbs and compact fluorescent lamps (CFL)

Mercury containing devices: thermometers and thermostats

Paint products: oil-based, latex and spray paints, caulk, wood preservative and wood stain

Garden chemicals: pesticides, herbicides, fertilizer and insecticides

Sharps: syringes, needles and lancets

Swimming pool chemicals

Other household chemicals: toilet bowl cleaner, shower/tile cleaner, carpet cleaner, rust remover and more

Medicines and prescriptions

Ammunition and explosives

Commercial or business supplies

Unknown or unlabeled materials

Trash, including bulky items, appliances and furniture

Incandescent light bulbs

Lamp fixtures

Asbestos

Smoke detectors

Liquid mercury

Leaking or empty containers

Radioactive items

Tires

Containers over 5 gallons

This is a good resource to find places that may accept common household items that are hard to dispose of.

The most common items that we get requests for are: motor oil, paint, prescription medicine, sharps and pesticides.

Motor oil: O'Reilly and AutoZone provide motor-oil recycling, batteries, other vehicle fluids.

Paint: Home Depot may take it - waste paint hardener - specifically designed to take liquid to solid. Once the paint is solidified this may be disposed of in the trash.

Pesticides: Waste Management or City of Phoenix

Prescription Medicine: local pharmacies - CVS at 35th ave and Glendale has a medication disposal program, Waste Management or City of Phoenix.
